

The Sacredness of Bodies

Our spiritual theme for the month of February is "bodies". The sacredness of bodies is a fundamental part of our faith. In the book of Genesis, we are reminded that we are made in the image of God, and therefore, our bodies are a reflection of the divine. In the Gospels, God demonstrates their divine love by becoming incarnate "embodied" in Jesus. Our bodies are not just shells for our souls; they are sacred and holy in and of themselves.

As believers in the incarnate God, it is important that we love and care for our own bodies. This means taking care of our physical, emotional, and spiritual health. This may mean engaging in regular exercise, eating nutritious food, getting enough sleep, and taking care of our mental health through practices such as meditation and prayer. Make a point of paying special attention to your body as a spiritual practice this month.

As important as it is to care for our own bodies, it is also important that we love and honor the bodies of all people, regardless of their skin color, abilities, size, gender, or sexual orientation. Every person is made in the image of God and therefore, every body is sacred. Even further, we are invited to be co-creators with God, participants in the ongoing health, care, and expression that our bodies take. As a community of faith, we must work to create a culture of acceptance and love for all bodies.

This means rejecting discrimination and harmful stereotypes, and instead embracing diversity and celebrating the unique beauty of every person. It also means working to address systemic inequalities and injustices that have led to marginalization of certain groups of people based on their bodies.

As we at Christ the King strive to love and care for our own bodies and the bodies of others, let us remember that we are all created in the image of God, who became embodied in Jesus. All bodies are sacred. Yes, even theirs! Yes, even yours!

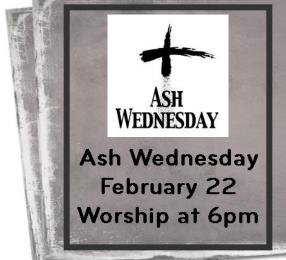

Meet a Musician: Jacob Johnson



This program year, we have been highlighting the people who help lead our worship music at CTK. This month we meet Jacob Johnson!

Jacob is currently a senior at Burnsville High School and has been involved in the music ministries here at CTK since singing in WOW in elementary school.

Jacob is part of AWB and the Chapel Ringers. Outside of CTK, Jacob plays music at school and teaches instruments to middle school band students.

Jacob, when did you first start doing music?

"I've been singing for as long as I can remember, but I started instrumental music in 3rd grade on viola. Around that time I also started playing handbells with the beginning bell choir. In 5th grade I switched to band and started playing trombone. Since 8th grade, I've learned almost every band instrument

(except flute) at a freshman level."

What was the first instrument you had lessons on?

"Viola in 3rd and 4th grade. Trombone from 5th grade on."

Which musical ensembles outside of CTK do you play in?

"Outside of CTK I play in Burnsville High School's Wind Ensemble (trombone), Jazz Ensemble (trombone), and Freshmen Band (bassoon)."

What sort of music do you listen to?

"I listen to almost all kinds of music on a regular basis. Recently, I've been listening to a lot of jazz and show tunes."

What first drew you / or who invited you to start doing music at CTK?

"I was first drawn into music here at CTK by Dr. John during choir in WOW. John encouraged me to sing more in church and bring my instruments along to play. I have fond memories of turning pages for John as he was playing the organ and learning how to play handbells from him. I also remember Nancy Turnquist telling me to "keep playing that trombone" after I played at one of the talent shows before she passed. All of the congregation has also been very supportive throughout the years!"

What is your favorite thing about your music teams, Chapel Ringers and Acclaim Worship Band? "I love the ability to connect with so many amazing people through music! We all work as a team to make a joyful noise and have a lot of fun and great fellowship!"

How does doing music influence your faith and religious life?

"To me, music is such a powerful way of expressing feelings. There are so many ways to praise God, and music speaks the most to me. One of my favorite pieces is the organ Toccata by Widor - because of how big, marvelous, mystical, and hopeful the piece is; it reminds me of God's overwhelming and never ending love!"

December 2022 total income was \$115,646.66 and disbursements were \$65,934.59 making us ahead for the month by \$49,712.07. This covered our deficits we had in the previous months and we, at year end, balanced the budget with a surplus of \$592. We reviewed and discussed our 2022 financials at the Jan 22nd 2023 budget meeting. We will look at them again at our annual meeting scheduled for Sunday January 29, 2023.
